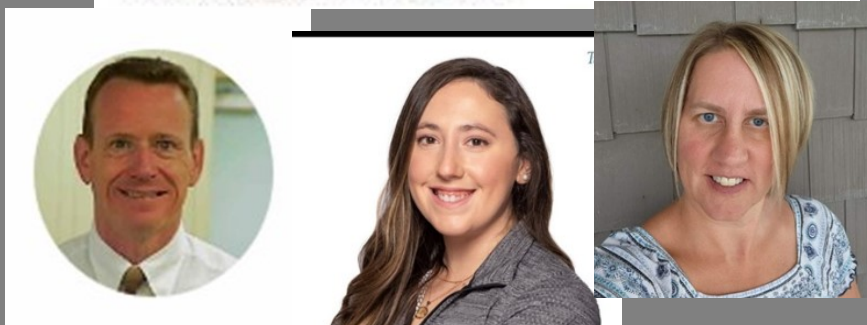
## “Stopping the Revolving Door”

The United States has one of the highest levels of incarceration on the planet, and as a result is very expensive in both direct and indirect terms.

The high rate of recidivism has a lot to do with that. Within three years after release, 66% of former state prison inmates have been arrested again, and within 10 years 82% have been re-arrested.

It doesn't have to be this way. In Clinton and Essex counties, the CV-TEC Corrections Education and Community Re-entry Program has reduced the recidivism rate for participating inmates to 21-23%.
